Classroom News

Preschool

In Preschool we learn new letters each week. Please remember to check your child's backpack and folder for information and homework. Look for stampers daily. MCSWSE will be hosting the Rex the RX program again this year, on Monday, October 14 at 9:00 a.m., parents are welcome to attend. On October, 17, we will be visiting Gritts Farm, permission slips have already gone home.

Kindergarten

In the Kindergarten classrooms we focus on stories each week. Some of our stories have included Listen, Listen, The Five Senses, What Makes a Family, Building with Dad, Friends at School, How do Dinosaurs go to School, I have a Pet, Please Puppy Please, Pizza at Sally's, and The Handiest Things in the World. We are also counting to 20 and writing numbers up to 5. Our Field Trip will be on Thursday, October 24, to Heritage Farms and permission slips have already gone home.

First Grade

First Grade has a weekly story and spelling words, which is a part of their reading grade. Please be sure to sign the homework sheet that shows that your child read their weekly story out loud to you. In Math we have been working on subtraction concepts and in Reading we are working on sequence of events. Our Field Trip is Thursday, October 18, to Heritage Farms.

Second Grade

In Second Grade we have a weekly story and spelling homework on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. Our Science focus has been on answering the essential question "What do plants and animals need to survive?". Our Social Studies focus has been on rules and responsibilities. We took our Field Trip to the WV Wildlife Center on Friday, October 4.

Third Grade

Remember to check Schoology for grades. Students have homework Monday through Friday. We have a weekly reading story and spelling words. In Math we are focusing on addition and subtraction. In Science our focus is animal habitats and in Social Studies we have learned the continents and oceans. We took our fall Field Trip to Safety City where students learned about safety issues related to fire, guns and bikes.

Fourth Grade

In fourth grade we are discussing the importance of being respectful to all adults and classmates and the importance of falling school and classroom rules. Be sure to have your child read at least 20 minutes each evening, complete homework assignments, return them to school. In reading we are focusing on cause and effect and in Math we are focusing on multiplication and division.

Fifth Grade

In fifth grade we are working on groups, double digit multiplication and division. In Reading we are working on sequence of events, poetry, and self-monitored reading. In Social Studies, our focus is WV History and in Science we are working on energy sources. We are also writing fiction narratives and practicing cursive. We will be taking a Field Trip to Powerama, Tuesday, October 15.

Ms. Lynch's Class

Ms. Lynch's class is learning to understand subtraction. We have a story each week that goes along with the words that we are learning each week. Please encourage your child to read nightly.


